Statement of intent

Dream, Believe, Achieve & Make a Difference

At Deanesfield Primary School we target the use of Pupil Premium Grant funding to ensure that our disadvantaged pupils receive the highest quality of education to enable them to become active, socially responsible citizens of the future. We recognise that disadvantaged children can face a wide range of barriers which may impact on their learning. Our ultimate objectives are to:

- ✓ Remove barriers to learning created by poverty, family circumstance and background
- ✓ Narrow the attainment gaps between disadvantaged pupils and their non-disadvantaged counterparts both within school and nationally
- ✓ Ensure ALL pupils are able to read fluently and with good understanding to enable them to access the breadth of the curriculum
- ✓ Develop confidence in their ability to communicate effectively in a wide range of contexts
- ✓ Enable pupils to look after their social and emotional wellbeing and to develop resilience.
- ✓ Access a wide range of opportunities to develop their knowledge and understanding of the world

Our context:

Achieving our objectives:

In order to achieve our objectives and overcome identified barriers to learning we will:

- ✓ Provide all teachers with high quality CPD to ensure that pupils access effective quality first teaching
- ✓ Provide targeted intervention and support to quickly address identified gaps in learning including the use of small group work, online learning programmes and personalised tailored interventions
- ✓ Target funding to ensure that all pupils have access to trips, residential, first hand learning experiences
- ✓ Target funding to ensure that all pupils have access to uniform and PE Kit as/when needed
- ✓ Provide opportunities for all pupils to participate in enrichment activities including sport and music
- ✓ Provide Chromebooks for home learning
- ✓ Provide appropriate nurture support to enable pupils to access learning within and beyond the classroom.

This is not an exhaustive list and strategies will change and develop based on the needs of individuals.

Key Principals:

We will ensure that effective teaching, learning and assessment meets the needs of all pupils through the rigorous analysis of data. Class teachers will identify through the class pupil premium plan specific intervention and support for individual pupils which will be reviewed at least termly. Alongside academic



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support, we will ensure that those pupils who have social, emotional and mental health needs will access high quality provision from appropriately trained adults.

Our strategy is also integral to wider school plans for education recovery, notably in its targeted support through the tailored and personalised intervention, support and resources for pupils whose education has been worst affected, including non-disadvantaged pupils.

This helps to ensure that pupils feel increasingly empowered to express their opinions. Exemplary attitudes mean everyone can learn well. 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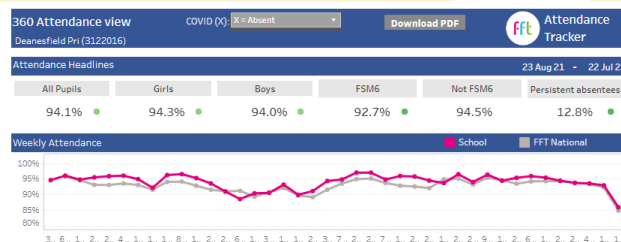

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Access to Wider Opportunities

Staff expect pupils to do well, and pupils rise to this expectation. They are motivated in lessons, interacting well with their friends. Pupils relish the opportunities for learning outside the classroom when they go on educational visits. For example, outings to art galleries and museums help to further enrich the ambitious curriculum.

Leaders work closely with parents, inviting them into school to experience what their children are learning. This helps parents to understand how their children are doing at school and how they can help at home. It also supports and nurtures the thriving relationship the school has with parents, who are fulsome in their praise of the school.

Emotional Well-Being and Mental Health

The school uses Zones of Regulation and children are given the vocabulary to use to describe their feelings. This vocabulary is developed according to age. The younger children are made aware of feelings and to recognise where they are at the start of the day and of changes as the day goes on. This support continues through the year groups and older children can clearly articulate how they feel and what they can do to help themselves.

It was a delight to listen to the two groups of children I met. Both the KS1 pupils and the KS2 pupils were enthusiastic and positive about their teachers, friends and school. They know what to do if they are 'stuck' in lessons, find the learning fun and know that they are safe and cared for. They particularly liked the new transition time that was given to them at the end of the Summer Term which gave them the opportunity to meet their new teachers and see their new classroom, explaining how this had helped to dispel worries and made the return to school in September much easier. The pupils know that they are valued and understand the role they play in supporting each other. They like the fact that they can write their worries down and that these worries are responded to. Teachers understand them and know that sometimes they need space to go and talk things through. The adults in the school look after them and help them to feel better when they are sad. One boy said how he felt very lucky to be in the school because of what was on offer and the excellent facilities like the welfare room. It was clear that the pupils appreciated the opportunities offered to them.

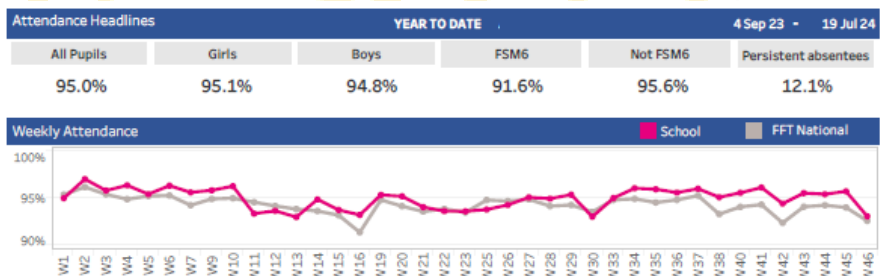
